'Music on Prescription'

'Music on Prescription' is a new project we have started in partnership with York Medical Group. Thanks to a grant from Postcode Community Trust, a grant-giving charity funded entirely by players of People's Postcode Lottery, we have been able to set up two new singing groups, one at York Medical Group's Acomb Road surgery, and one at Tower Court Health Centre in Clifton. A recent BBC programme, 'Trust Me, I'm a Doctor', did a study looking at feel-good chemicals called endocannabinoids, which are thought to be responsible for 'runners' high' — in the study, singing raised the levels of these chemicals in the blood more than running! York Medical Group is hoping that their patients will be able to experience these benefits, while at the same time enjoying the opportunity to make new social connections with other music-lovers - there is a wealth of research which shows a clear link between loneliness/social isolation and ill health, and so it is hoped that the chance to sing AND meet others will provide a real boost to patient health!

'It's a good idea - you're socialising and all getting together to learn songs and harmonise. It's relaxing - I have arthritis, but when I come here, I forget about it - I think you forget your medical problems. That's why I bought a guitar, it's a hobby for me now' (Eddie: pictured above)
