
Musical Connections Singers Light Up Age UK York's AGM On 6th October, Age UK

Several participants from Haxby Hall carehome and Gale Farm Court sheltered housing scheme travelled over to Rufforth school to take part in an afternoon project on the second world war. The children were agog to hear about the experiences of their older visitors who, in turn, were delighted to be invited into school to have their stories heard. The event was underpinned by songs from the era and, afterwards, Rufforth's headteacher said 'It really was an amazing event – well done and thank you!'.

Another school visit was made by residents of Woolnough House, who joined a class of Year 2s at St Aelreds for a singing and samba session. Beryl was utterly absorbed by the session and joined in all the different songs and rhythms with great accuracy and concentration – it turned out she had had music lessons when younger, and was loving the opportunity to take part in another one – it was difficult to drag her away!

The half term was rounded off by a delightful session with Burton Green school's reception class, who visited Morrell House to share some of their favourite songs with the residents. Both adults and children were excited to sing together, and, despite their tiny size, some of the children were confident enough to chat with the residents, who were absolutely captivated by their little visitors.
